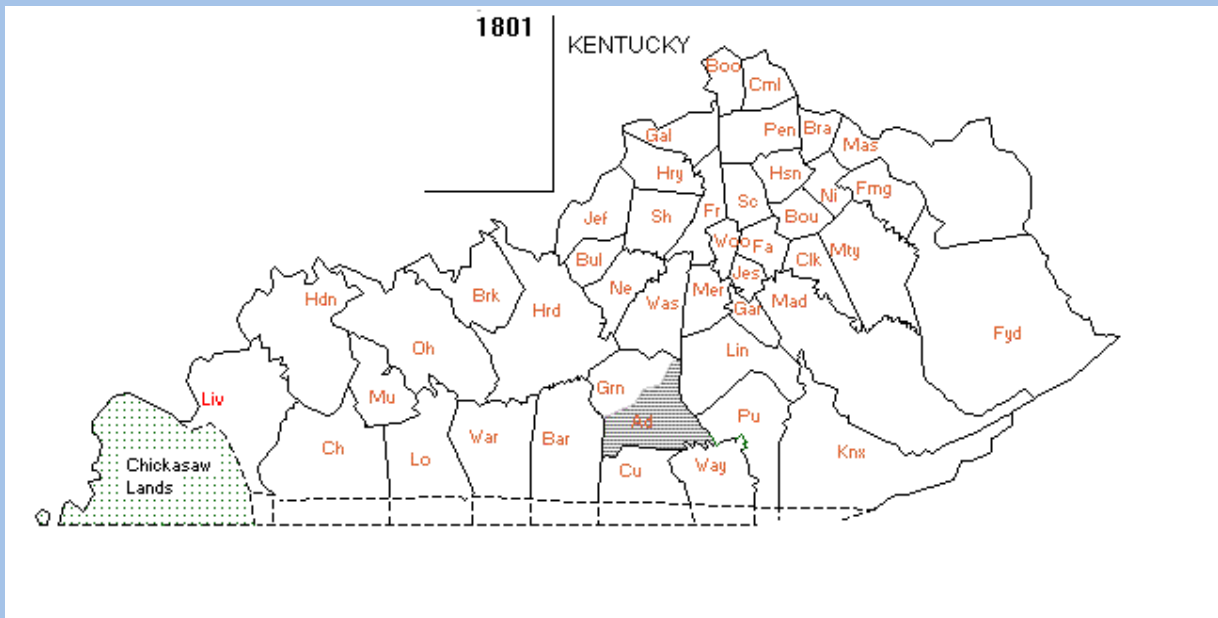

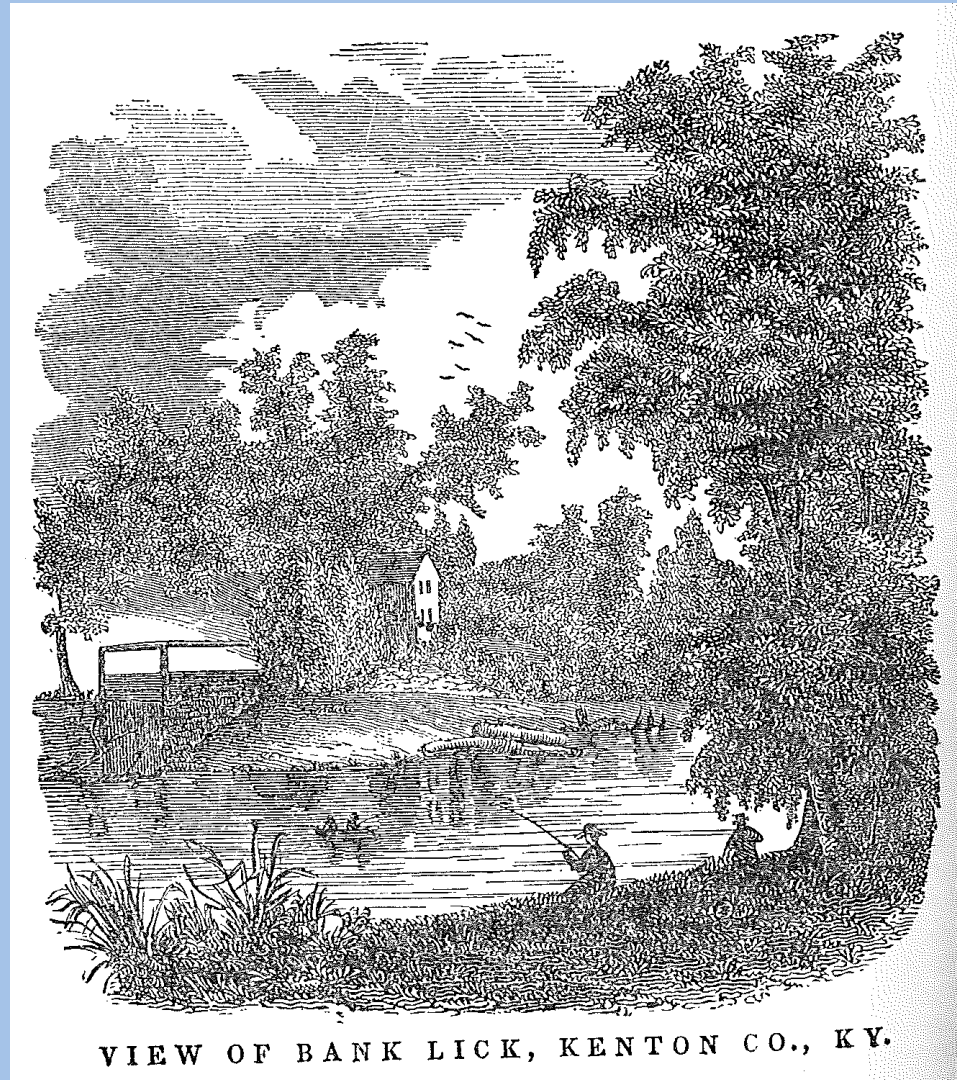

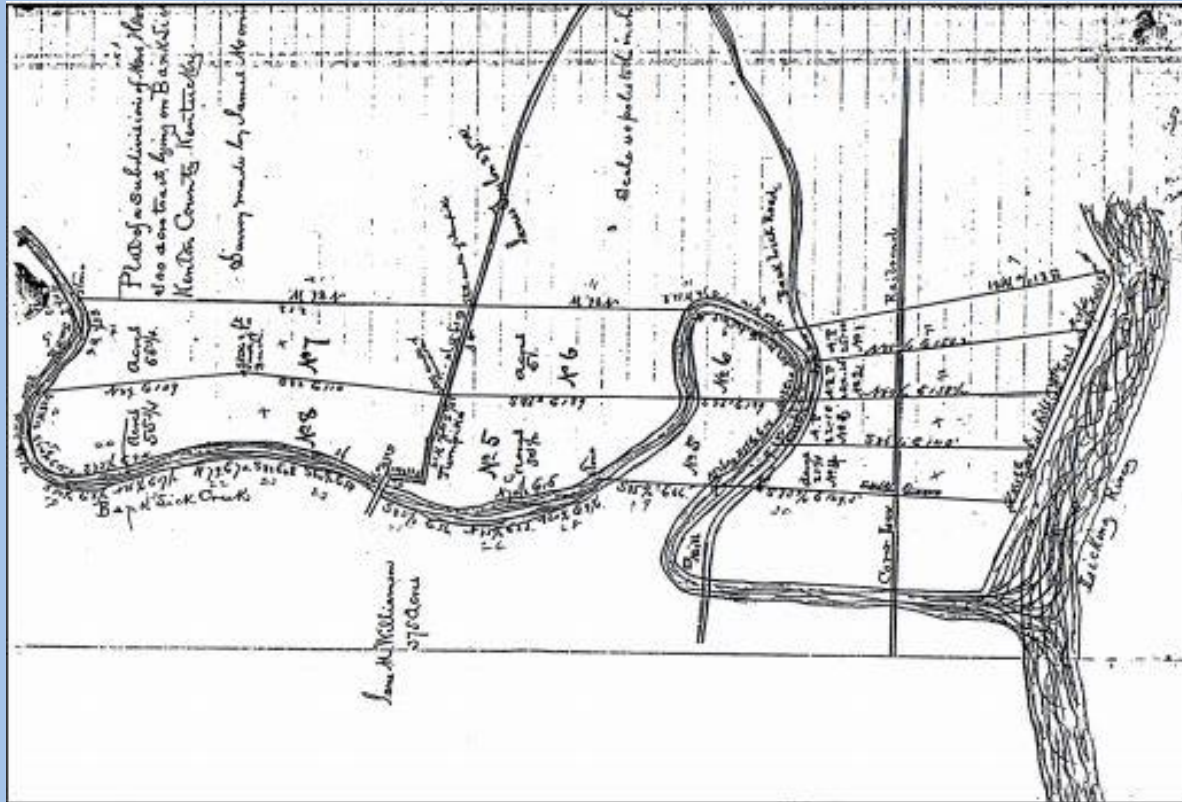

### Covington and Taylor's Mill Turnpike Road.

We learn from Mr. R. PATTON, President of this road, that the work is progressing in a satisfactory manner. The grading is pretty well advanced, and with favorable weather will be finished early in the ensuing spring. The bridge over Bank Lick will be completed in about sixty days. The pike will intersect the railroad at Cole's; and to obviate all danger of collision the Directors of the pike have determined to make a tunnel under the railroad.

It remains for the City Council to make a connection with the turnpike by improving Greenup street through to the corporation line. We suppose this will be attended to in due time.

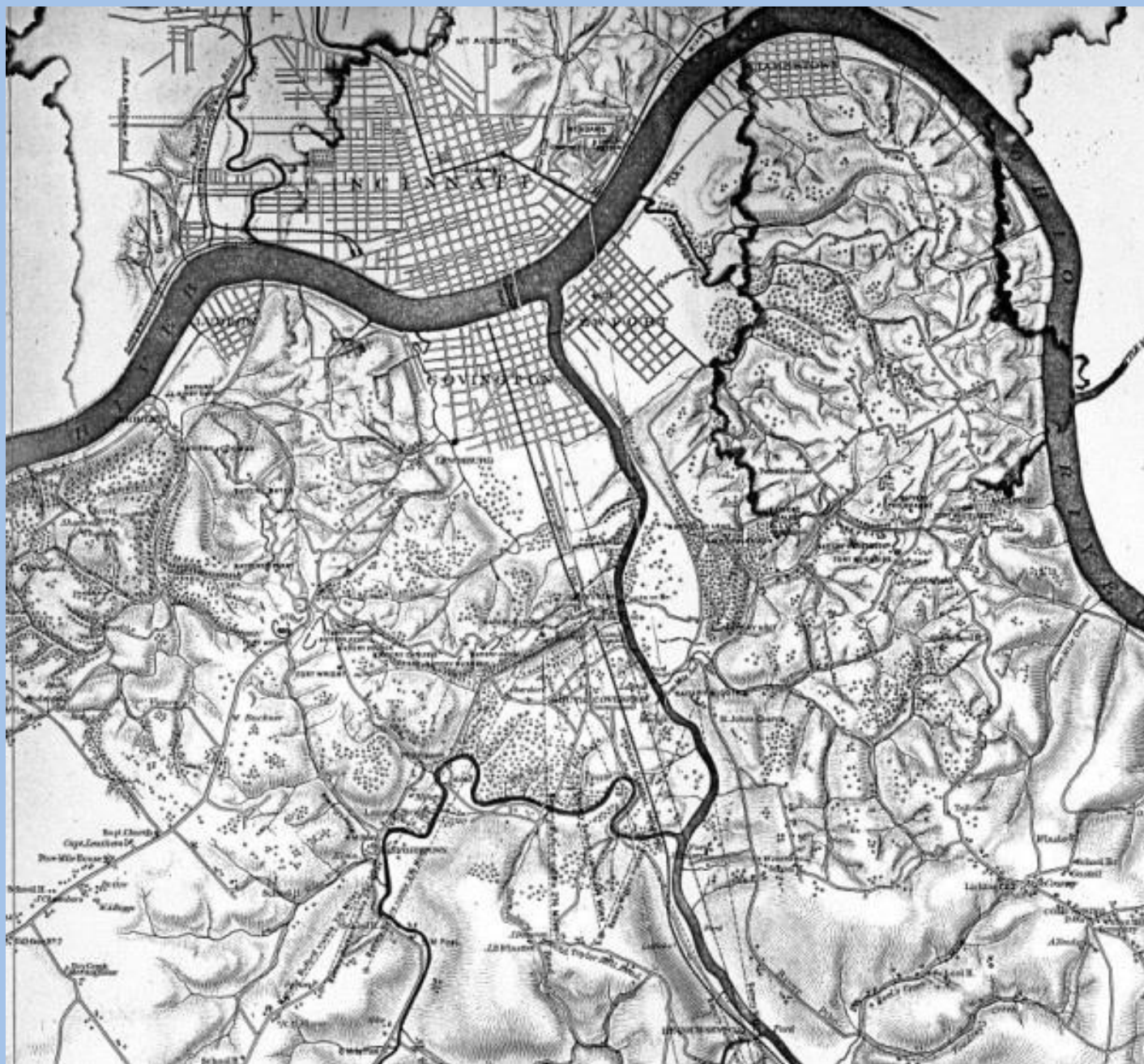

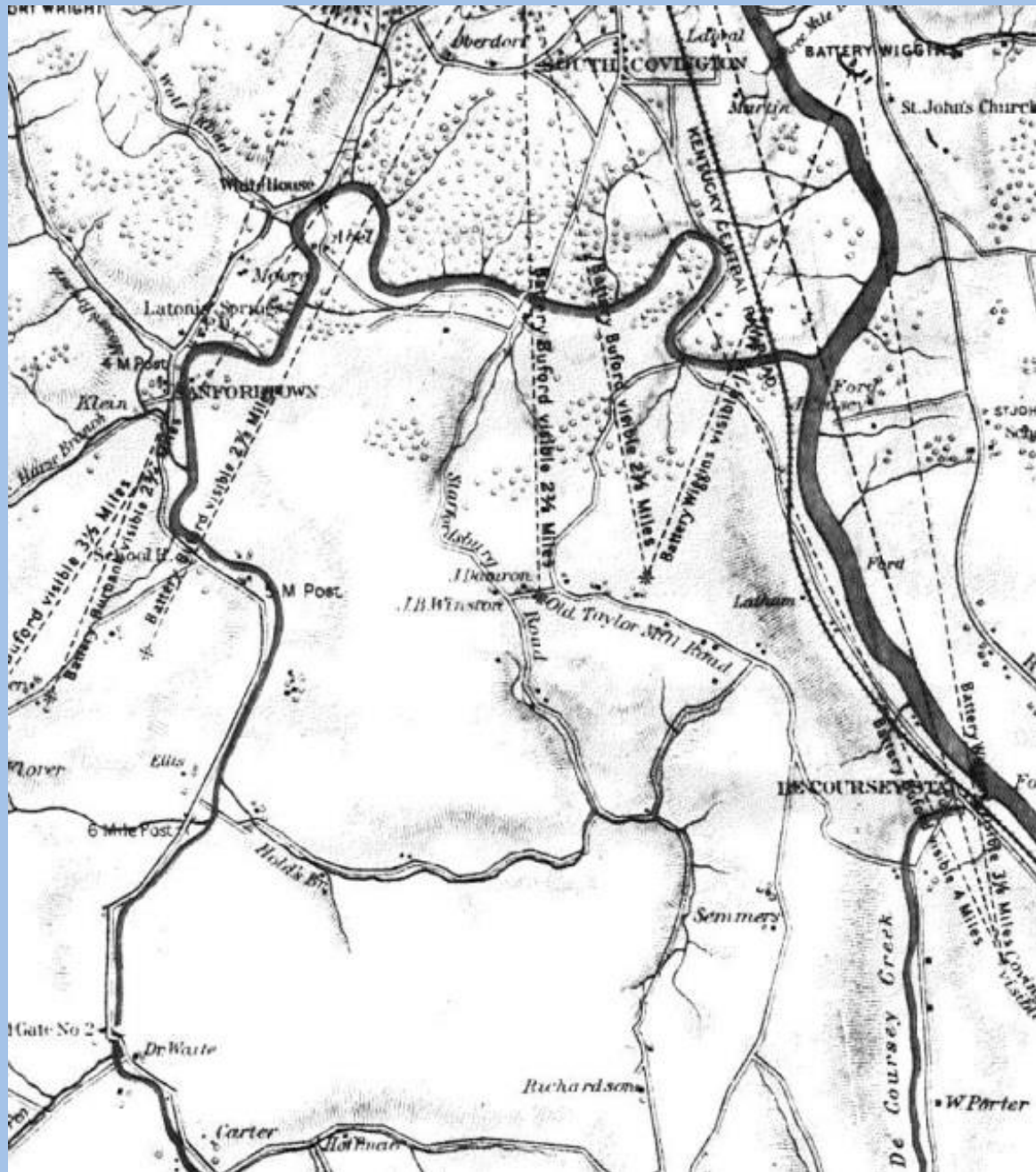

**Change in the Kentucky Central.**

Yesterday was made notable in local annals by the formal transfer of the Kentucky Central railroad to the new owners.

The occasion is a fitting one to say that under the late management of the road the public have been faithfully served. It is true that occasional complaints have been made, and in some instances not without cause, but we repeat that on the whole the officers and agents of the company are entitled to credit for the care and prudence that have marked their management. This is strikingly shown by the comparatively few fatal accidents that have occurred. We believe the loss of human life on the K. C. has been much below the average.

It is understood there will be no radical change in the general policy of the company, and no attempt to transfer the depot from Covington to Cincinnati.

The road will be extended South, but the route has not been selected.

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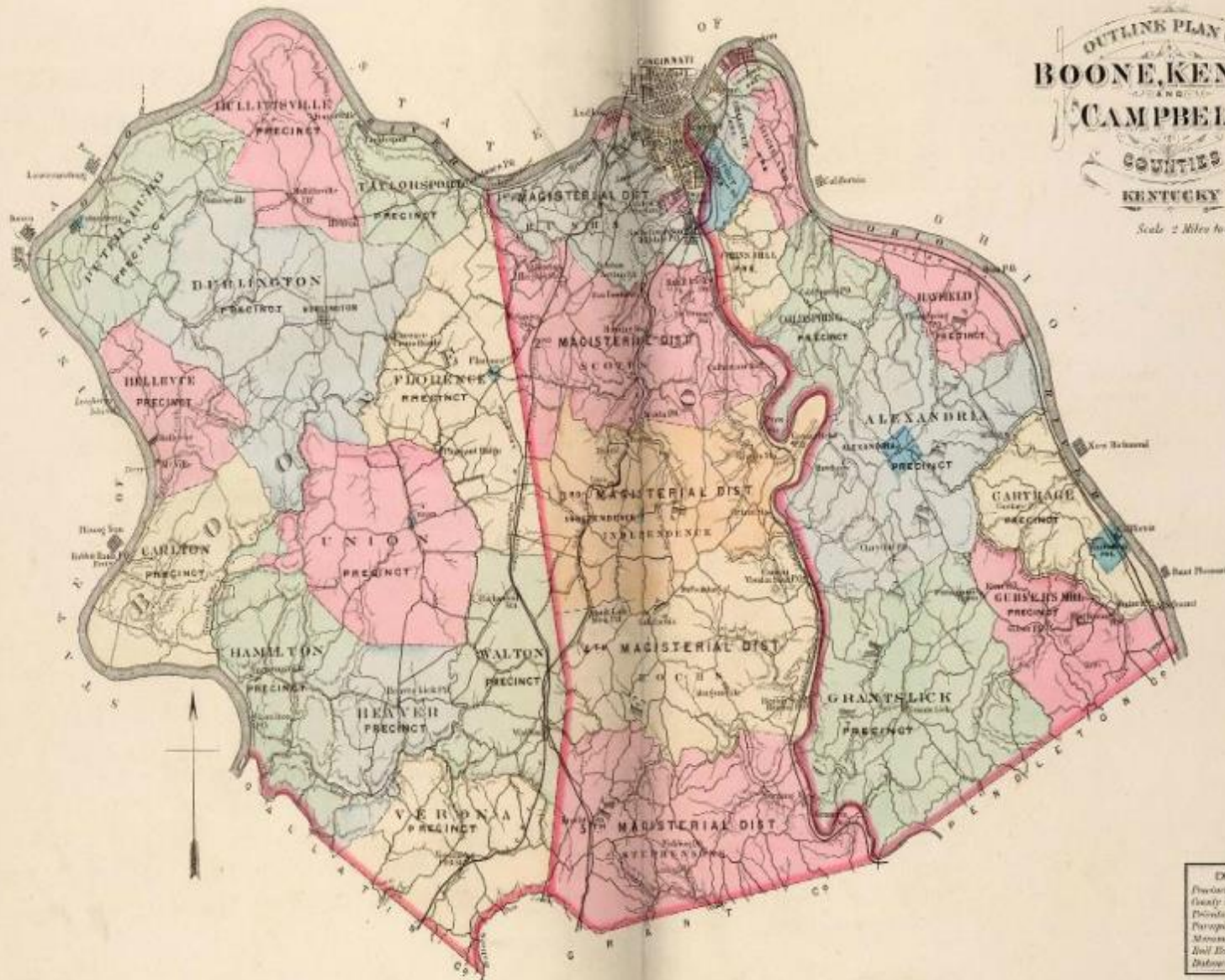
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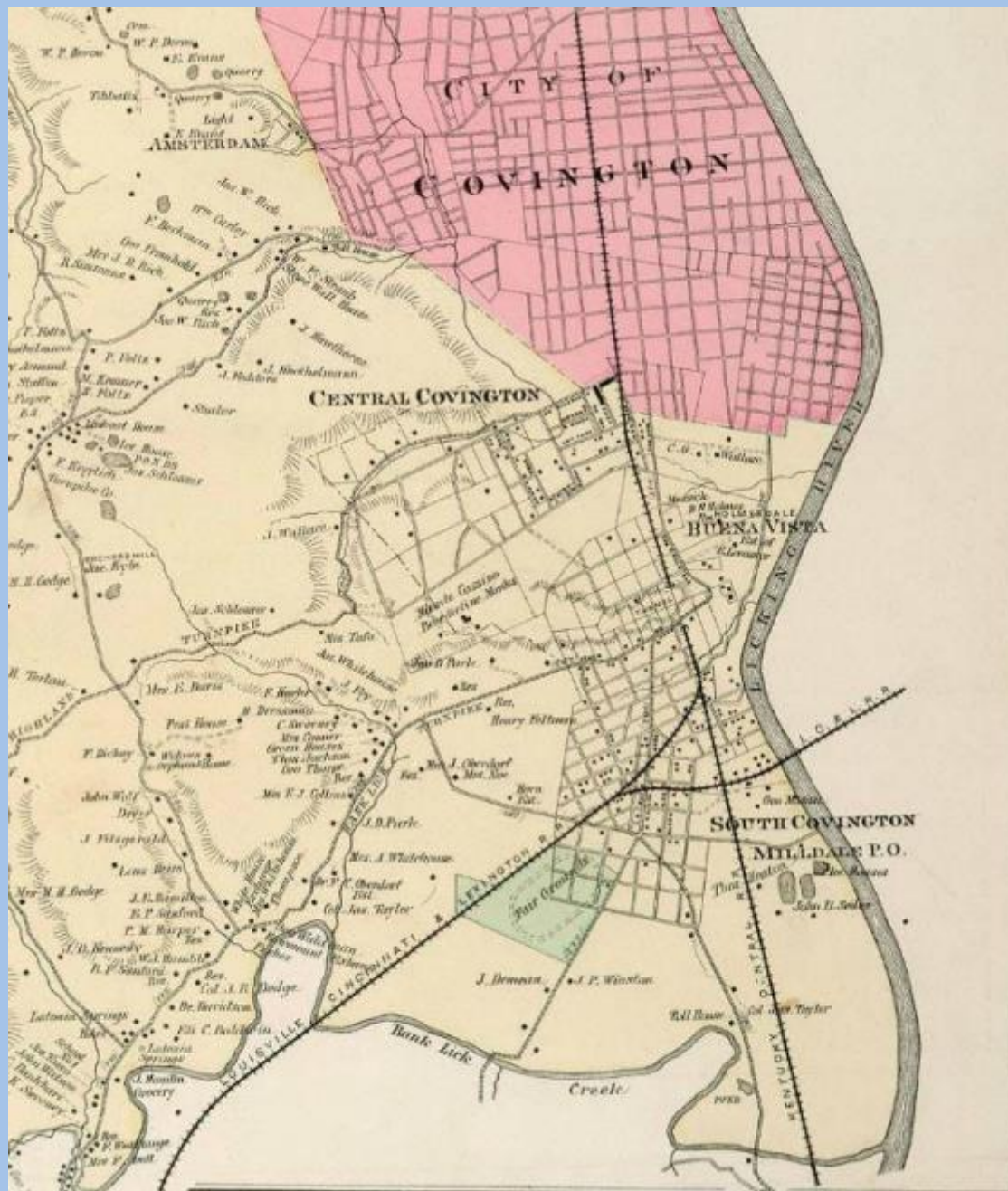
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OUTLINE PLAN OF

 KENTUCKY

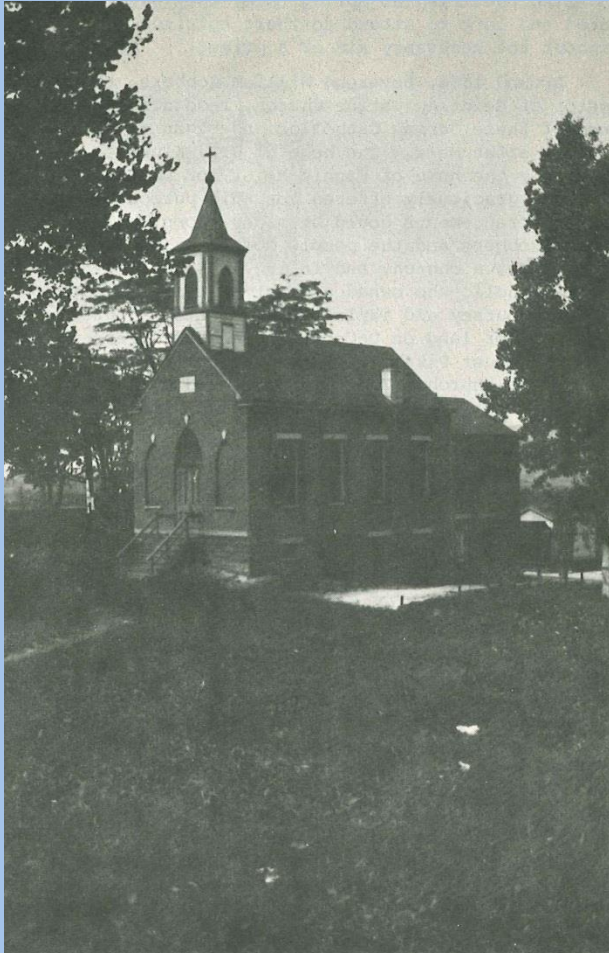

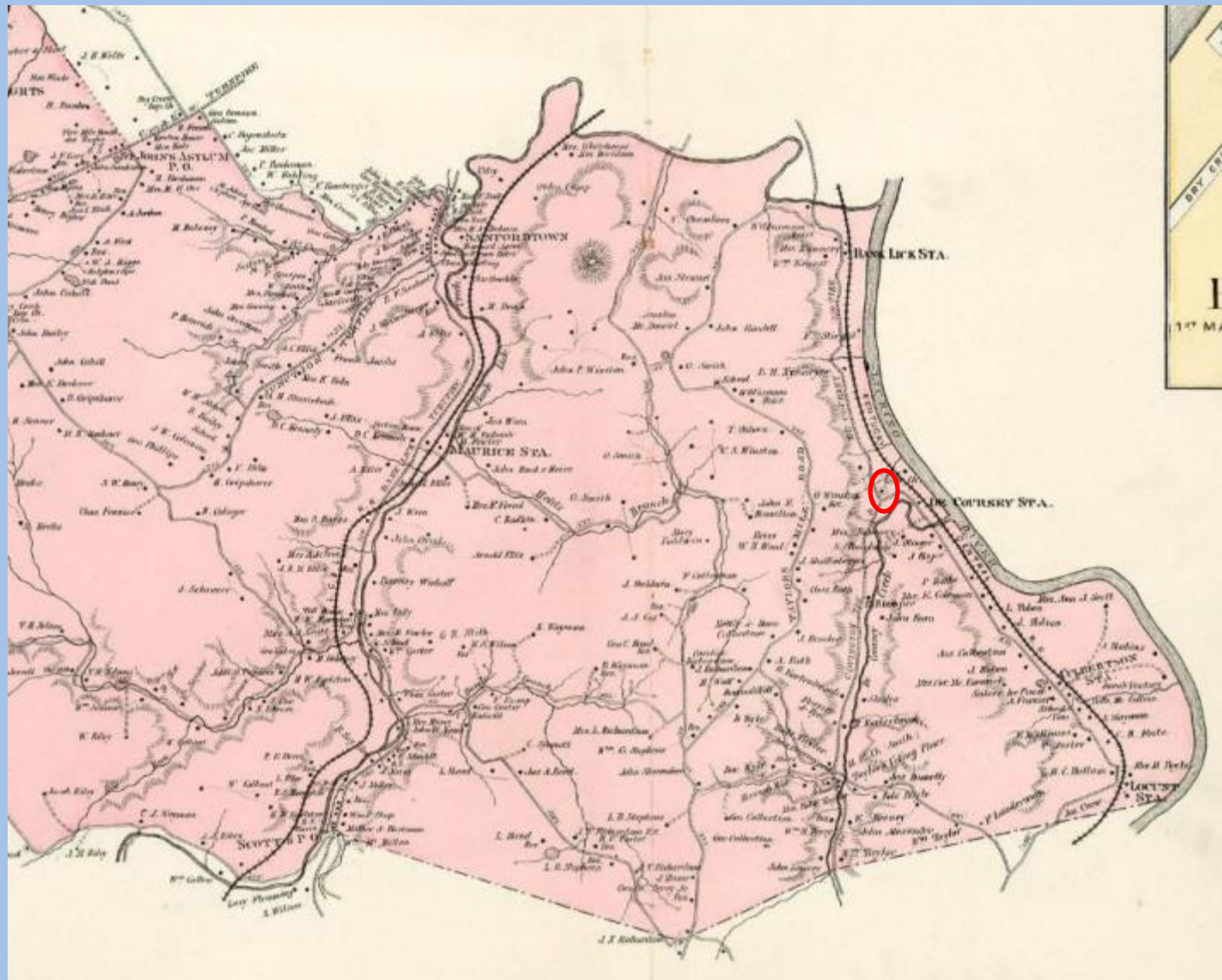

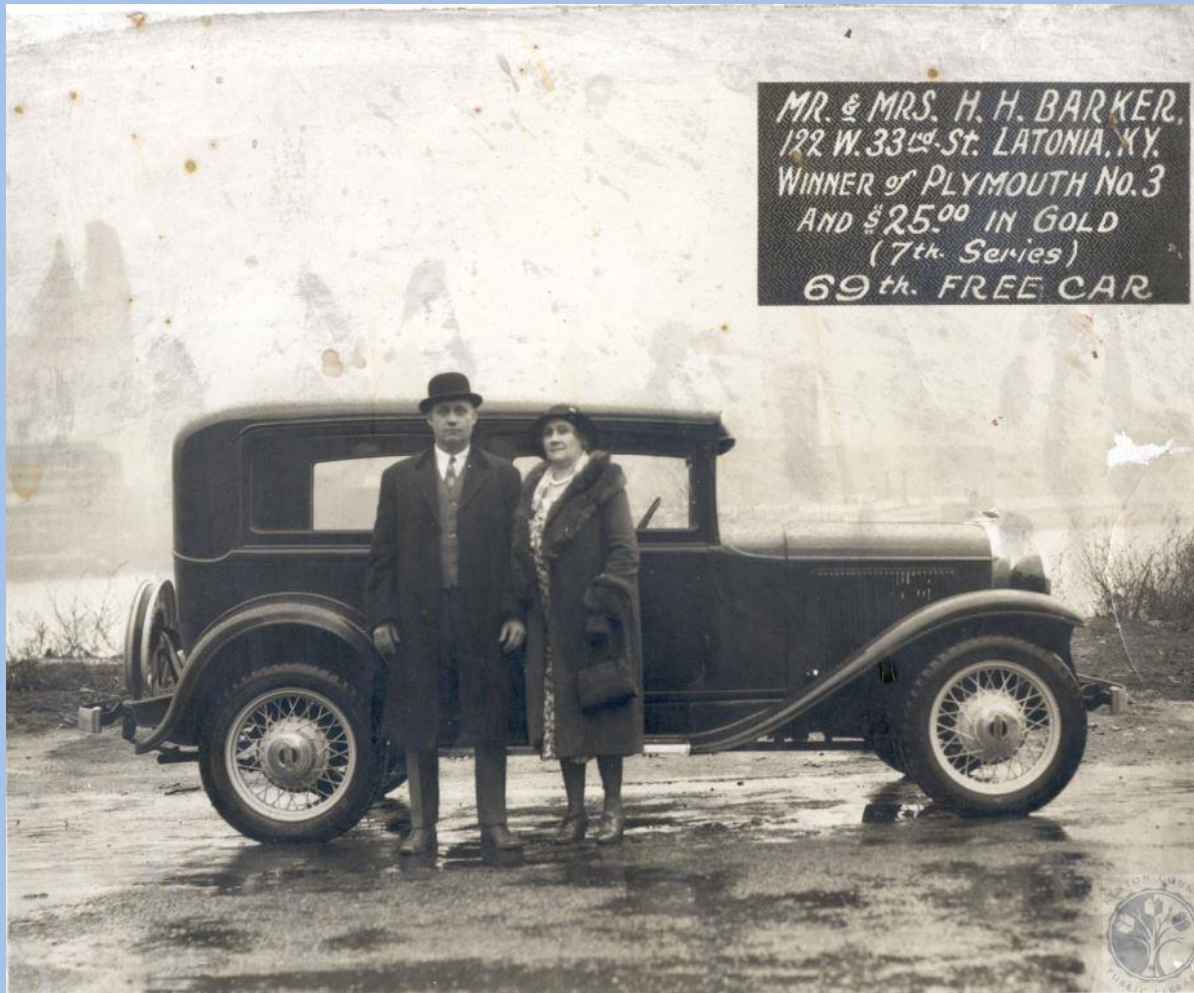

The new subdivision is located at Grand-av. and Taylor Mill-pike south of Latonia and is to be known as Forest Hills.

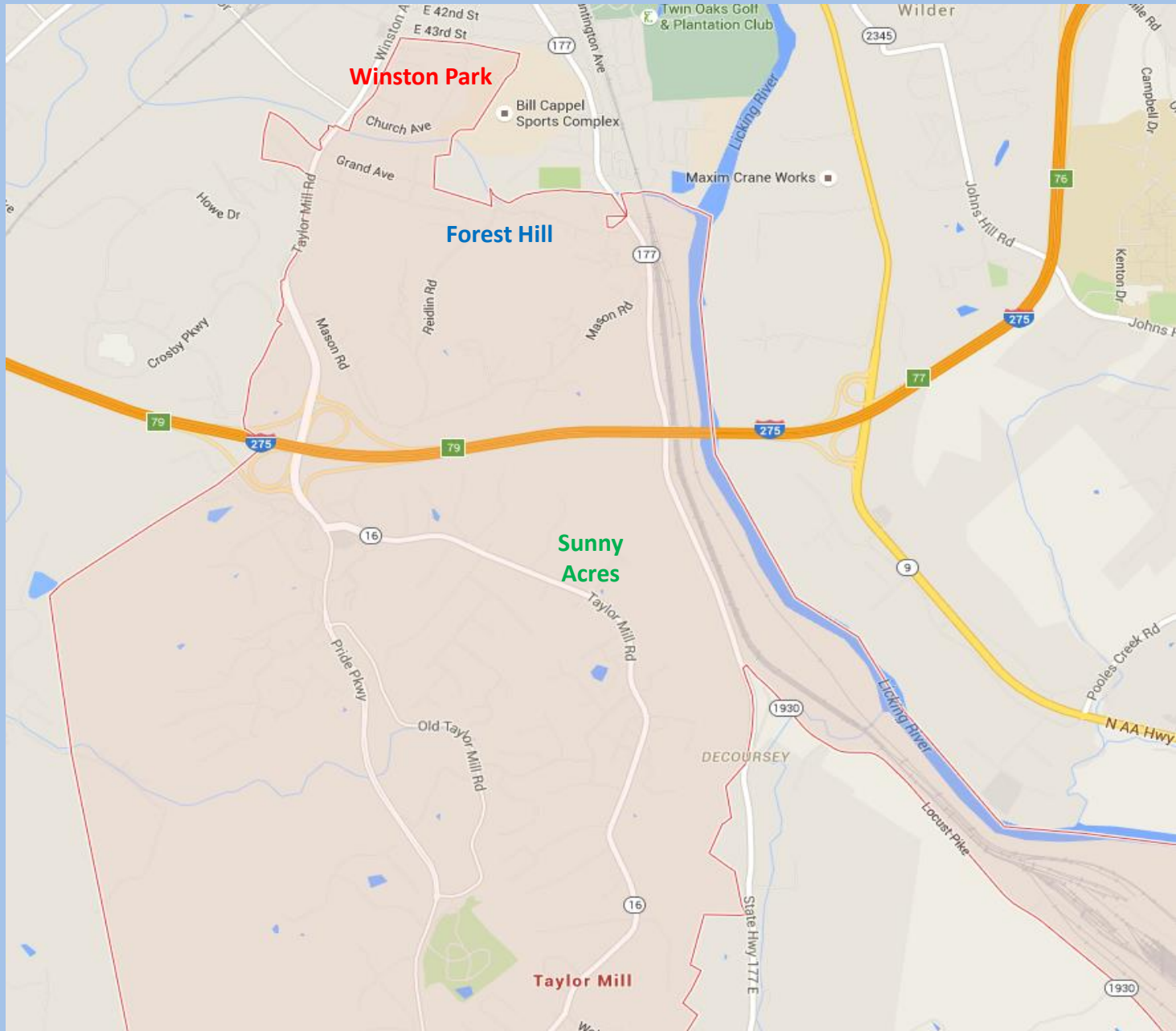

# New City Formed On Taylor Mill Officers Appointed

Incorporation of a section of Taylor Mill Pike as a sixth-class city was approved Friday in an order by Judge Rodney G. Bryson of Kenton Circuit Court.

The new community, to be known as the city of Taylor Mill, comprises 125 residents.

Through an agreement with the petitioners, the court set up a five-man board of trustees composed of R. Vernon Barhorst, John A. Bessler, George Vogelsang, Gayle Alford and R. I. Marshall. John Jansen was named police judge.

All appointed officers will serve until successors are named at the next regular election.

The order creating the city was handed down on a petition filed April 9 by Attorney Charles H. Deters, representing the petitioners, after the court held there were no objections to the incorporation of an area not to exceed one quarter mile in each direction.

**THE INCORPORATION** petition was filed shortly after the city of Covington announced plans to annex all unincorporated territory south of the city.

The area lies along both sides of Taylor Mill Pike between Wolf rd. and Ridgeview Subdivision.

# Merger Plan For Towns On Taylor Mill

FRANKFORT, Ky.—If Taylor Mill and Sunny Acres, two sixth class cities in Kenton County want to merge it probably will take a court ruling to determine the proper steps to be taken.

That was the opinion given by first assistant Attorney General Walter C. Herdman to Charles H. Deters, city attorney for Taylor Mill.

Mr. Deters wrote that the cities, of the sixth population class, are adjacent to each other.

Mr. Herdman explained that in his view Kentucky statutes are not clear on how such a merger could be accomplished.

Mr. Deters said several residents of each town have discussed the possibility of merging, citing advantages in operating as one city instead of the present duplication of governments and services.

The community of Forest Hills is scheduled to become a part of Winston Park within the next week.

Trustees of Winston Park passed an ordinance Tuesday annexing approximately 64 acres of the Forest Hills area.

### Goes Up in Class

Annexation of Forest Hills has been under consideration for approximately eight years.

"Annexation of Forest Hills will permit us to be raised from a sixth to a fifth class city in the near future," Winston Park Mayor William Dorsey said.

Larry West, city attorney for Winston Park, said the annexation will become official when the ordinance is published.

The area to be annexed contains approximately 105 homes and about 300 residents.

### 198 Winston Homes

Winston Park now has 198 homes and about 900 residents.

The Forest Hills area to be annexed is south of Winston Park.

It is bounded on the east by Howard street, runs south to the end of Howard street, then west to the new Covington city limits.

Covington attempted to annex the Forest Hills area approximately four years ago but was blocked by the previous annexation move by Winston Park.

### Opposed Earlier

When Winston Park first proposed to annex Forest Hills, property owners in Forest Hills filed suit in Kenton Circuit Court protesting the move.

No action was taken on the suit.

"I do not expect opposition to the new annexation proposal," Dorsey said.

During the merger campaign supporters said joining of the two cities would pro-

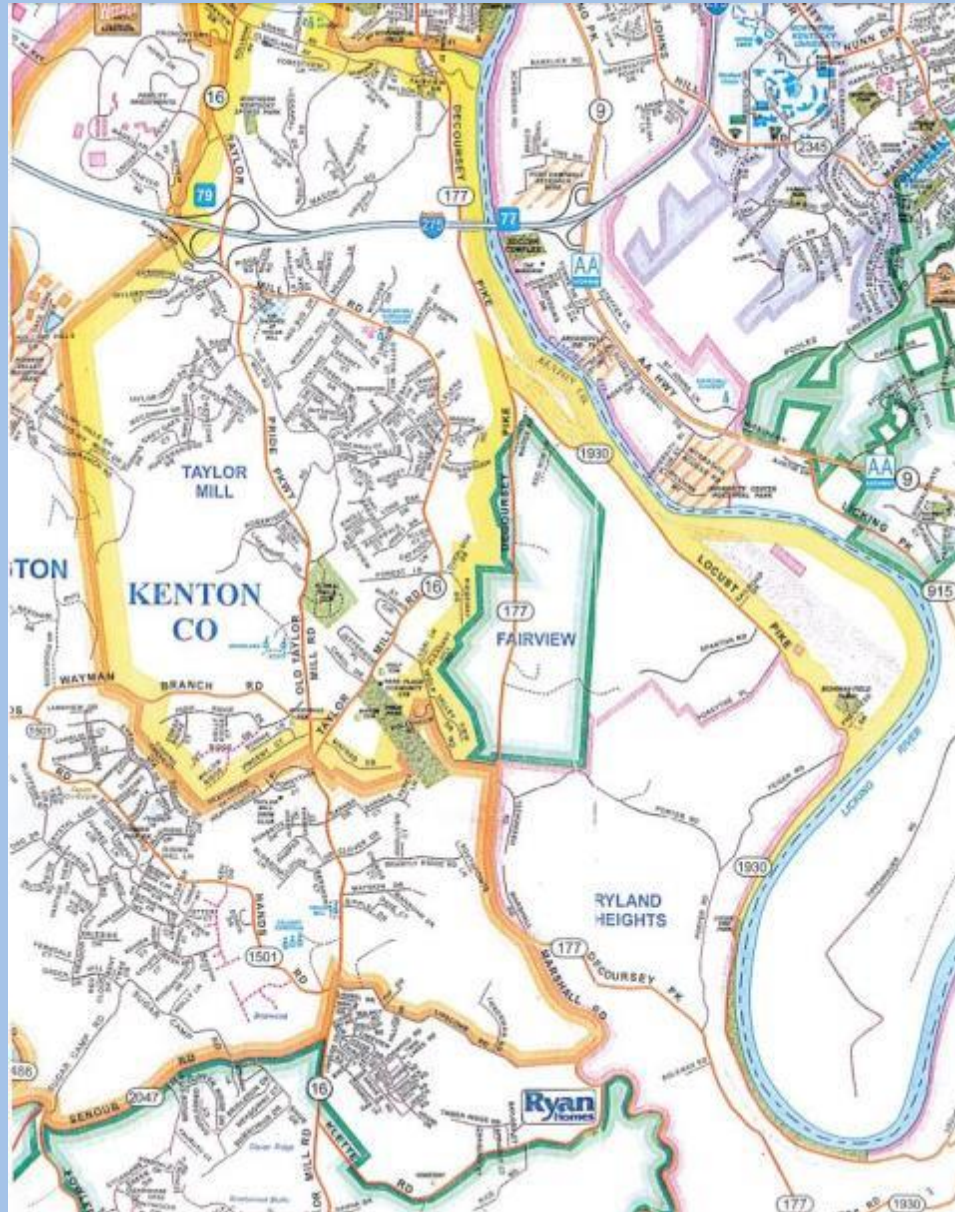
vide better police and fire protection for both cities.

It also was said the tax rate would not be increased with the exception of a necessary hike to make up for tax loss by the Homestead Exemption Act for property owners 65 and over.

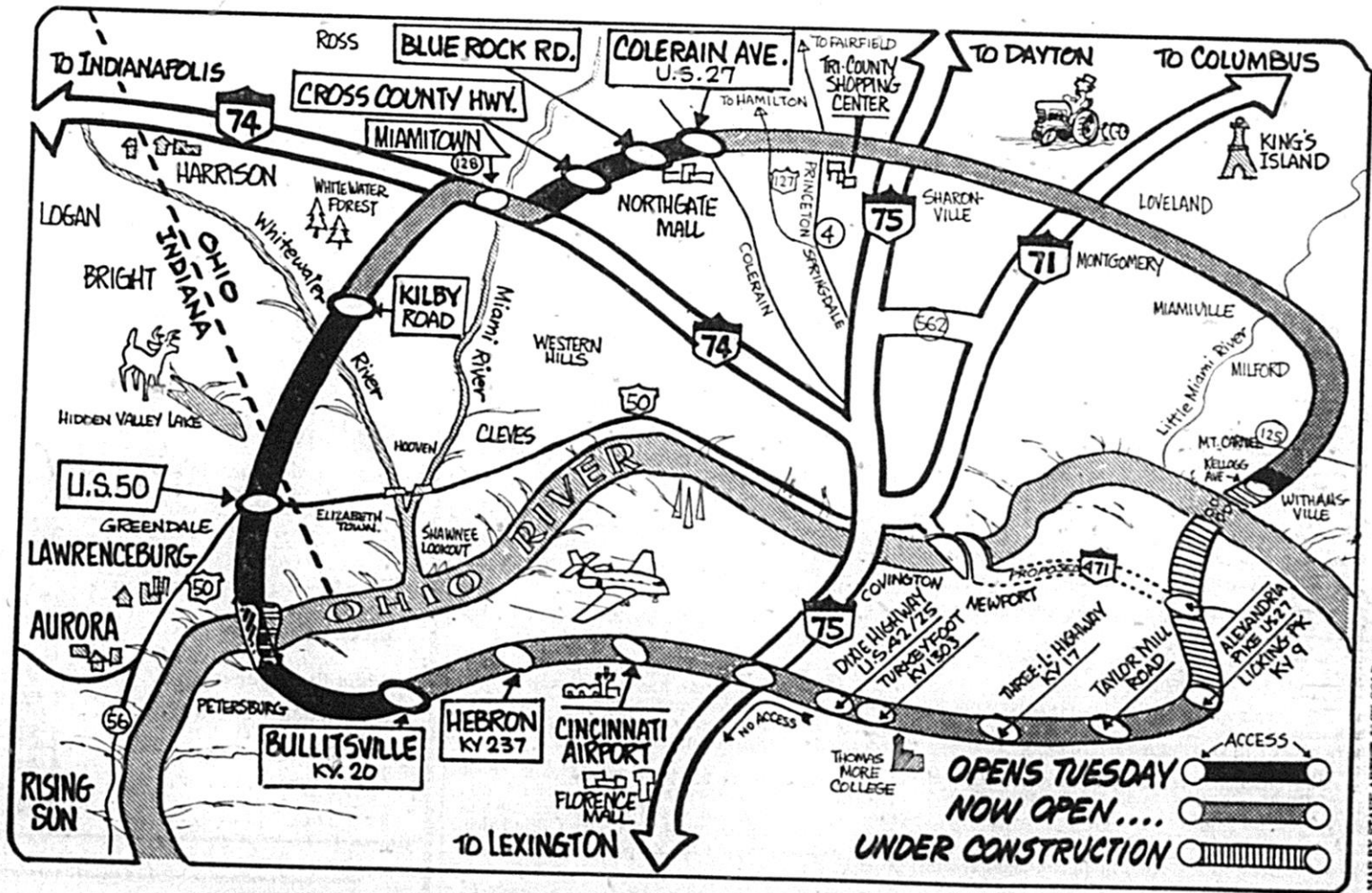

TAYLOR MILL – A long-awaited state road project that is expected to usher in more commercial development for the city of Taylor Mill should be finished soon.

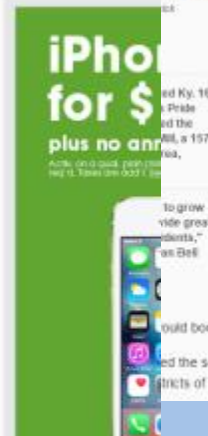
The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet expects a \$16.1 million road project, which had a total design and construction cost of \$79.2 million in state funds, to be done by the end of summer.

The project improves access from I-275 to the cities of Taylor Mill, Independence and southern Kenton County.

When it's done, Ky. 16 will offer motorists and residents smoother traffic flow and safety, said Nancy Wood, spokeswoman for the cabinet's Department of Highways in Northern Kentucky. "We widened it, realigned it, took out the curves and improved it, making a safer roadway."

But it does more than that, says Taylor Mill Mayor Dan Bell. It gives his city a chance at new business and could boost revenue and draw in more visitors.

The project covers the section of road that is within the city limits of Pride Parkway and Independence Parkway, a 157-acre commercial area, around it.
